Christmas Tree Recycling

Start the New Year by recycling your Christmas tree. From January 2-15, residents who receive curbside pickup service can call (780) 623-6739 to have their trees picked up and recycled. If you don't receive curbside service, or if you miss the deadline, you can bring your tree to any County landfill or transfer station at no charge.

Only natural trees will be accepted, and trees must not have any decorations left on them. For every tree that we recycle, a new one will be planted in a local park.

Green Rebate Program

The County wants to reward residents who take steps to consume less water and energy. Whenever you buy certain Energy Star or WaterSensecertified appliances, you could earn some money back. Please call the County's Utilities department at (780) 623-6730 for more details.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

- 1) You must be a resident of Lac La Biche County.
- **2)** Your purchase must have been made between January 1, 2023 and December 31, 2023.
- **3)** Your appliance must be an Energy Star or WaterSensecertified item from the following categories:

Fire Season Begins


Permits are required for all burning except campfires from March 1 to October 31. Burning and campfires alike are prohibited when fire bans are announced. This is to protect you, public safety and the natural environment.

Please call (780) 623-6767 to ask about permits, what you can and can't burn, and more.

Burning Waste: Not Just A Fire Hazard

It's against the law to burn waste in Lac La Biche County, and it can harm you and the environment. Burning waste releases pollutants and toxic substances that can end up in the air, water and soil, affecting plants, animals and people.

Remember that local residents are allowed to bring up to 500 kg. (about 1,100 lbs.) of waste to a landfill or transfer station at no charge. Disposing of waste properly, rather than burning it, is a much healthier choice for you, your family and future generations.

Community Garden

The Community Garden in Alexander Hamilton Park has 40 plots available for residents to grow their own plants and produce. You can apply for a plot in-person at the County Centre office on Highway 881, or download the form from the County website and email it to green@laclabichecounty.com.

Gardeners have the option to pay \$20 for a raised bed plot or a ground plot!

Applications for plots will be accepted from April 1 to June 1.

Put Down Roots

Starting April 1, you can order bundles of tree seedlings through our Environmental Services department. They're great for beautifying your property, growing a shelterbelt or just adding to the environment in your area. Check the website or call 780-623-6739 for details.

Agriculture Equipment

Farming is a lot of work, so let us help you get the job done in the safest and most environmentally friendly way possible. You can rent agricultural equipment from the County, including some items that are not commercially available. Items range from air seeders to live animal traps. Visit the County's website for a breakdown of rental rates.

If you own more than 80 acres of agricultural land or a pesticide applicator license, you can also buy agricultural pesticides from the County. Call (780) 623-6739 for details.

Aquatic Invasive Species

Boating season starts this month, so it's time to keep your eyes open for aquatic invasive species. Nonnative species such as Zebra Mussels and Eurasian Water Milfoil, can attach to watercraft and "hitchhike" between water bodies. That's why it's important to clean, drain and dry your watercraft every time it leaves the water.

Not-so-fun fact: Eurasian Water Milfoil has been nicknamed the 'zombie plant' because parts of it can detach from the root, be transported to a new site, and come back to life as a new plant. The County monitors for Eurasian Water Milfoil in our lakes annually. As of 2023, it has not been found in our County, and we'd like to keep it that way.

Roadside Spraying and Mowing Program

The County controls noxious and prohibited noxious weeds on all public properties including roadsides using an integrated approach. This includes the use of broadleaf herbicides. In addition to chemical weed control, roadside mowing is done from June to October, weather permitting. In the last two years, more than 5000 km of roadside vegetation was mowed.

CORE Program



Did you know as much as 30% of the average household's waste is organic? With the Community Organics Recycling Enhancement (CORE) program, it's easy to learn how to compost and reduce the amount of waste going to landfills. We teach people the basics of backyard composting and provide them with free supplies to get started. This is held during Environment Week, so stay tuned for 2024 dates and details.

In 2022, participants diverted over 400 lbs of organic waste from going to landfills!

Controlling Clubroot

Clubroot is a serious soil-borne disease that affects cruciferous plants like canola. Over time, the disease will stunt a plant's growth and eventually kill it. To limit the spread of the disease, the Alberta Clubroot Management Plan recommends taking steps like sanitizing farm equipment, rotating crops and growing disease-resistant crop varieties.

Lac La Biche County has a Clubroot Management Agreement Plan for affected producers. If you suspect clubroot is in your fields, call (780) 623-6739 or email agriculture@laclabichecounty.com to find out what you can do, and how we can help.

Riparian Areas

Our County is home to numerous riparian areas, found along lakes, rivers, and wetlands. These natural spots thrive with native plants, acting as a buffer between waterbodies and upland areas. They're nature's filters, keeping our water clean by trapping runoff, preventing erosion, and reducing flooding. Plus, they're essential homes and food sources for local wildlife.

Do Your Part To Prevent Blue-Green Algae

Cyanobacteria, known as blue-green algae occurs naturally in our lakes, but human activity can have a big impact on the frequency and severity of algae blooms. There are ways you can help keep the unpleasant blooms to a minimum.

- Don't pour anything into a storm drain. Anything that goes down the storm drain eventually ends up in a nearby water body.
- Avoid using unnecessary excessive fertilizers, pesticides and other products on your property. These can enter water bodies as runoff.
- Leave shorelines in their natural states. Native vegetation along shorelines is vital in filtering runoff.
- If you have a septic system, check it regularly to make sure it isn't leaking and empty it often.
- Take steps to keep cattle and other livestock away from lakes and rivers. See Alternative Watering Systems in September.

Blue-Green Algae is toxic. If you see a bloom, do not swim in the water, and do not let pets swim in or drink the water.

Did You Know?



In 2023, the Implementation Committee for the Lac La Biche Watershed Management Plan was hard at work reviewing and implementing action items set in place to improve the health of the watershed and lake water quality. You can see the updated Watershed Plan on the County website.

Recycling Contamination

There are some things in life that just don't mix. Waste and recyclables are a perfect example. Recyclables, like clean plastic and cardboard, are considered contaminated once they've been mixed with waste. That means it may be more difficult, or even impossible, to properly sort and process them. A recent County waste and recycling audit showed at least 35% of what goes into curbside recycling containers is actually misplaced waste.

PLASTIC (CLEAN)

- · Hard/rigid household bottles and containers (e.g. shampoo, margarine, yogurt, labels are okay)
- Stretchy plastic bags, combine into one bag and tie closed

PAPER & CARDBOARD (CLEAN)

- Newsprint and paper (not shredded) Magazines and paperback books
- Gift wrap (non-metallic)
- Cardboard boxes (flattened), and box board (cereal boxes, etc.)
- Pizza boxes with food and paper liner removed
- Hardcover books can be recycled once the cover is removed


HOUSEHOLD METAL (CLEAN)

- Cans (labels are okay) and lids
- Aluminum trays
- · Metal coffee cans

REDEEMABLE ITEMS

The following can also be redeemed for deposit at the recycling depot:

- Milk jugs and cartons
- Tetra-paks (juice boxes)
- Pop/beverage bottles, plastic only
- Pop/beverage cans
- Coffee creamer bottles



What goes where is now online!

RECYCLING AT LANDFILLS & TRANSFER STATION

PLASTIC

- All plastics as listed in the curbside recycling column.
- Agricultural twine (unknotted in a clear plastic bag, tied closed)

MIXED PAPER AND CARDBOARD

- All clean paper and cardboard as listed in the curbside recycling column.
- Shredded paper (must be in clear plastic bag)

APPLIANCES AND METAL

- Household metals such as aluminum travs and cans, or metal coffee cans.
- BBQs, lawnmowers, tools, refrigerators, etc.
- Fire extinguishers and propane tanks (emptied and vented)

CEMENT, ASPHALT, SOIL, GRAVEL

(landfills only — call prior to disposal)

AUTOMOTIVE AND MOTORIZED

- Tires (no tracks)
- Car parts or ATVs must have batteries and fluids removed

WOOD (no nails)

- · Wood chips, stumps, brush, pallets
- Keep painted or treated wood items separate

LIGHTING

Fluorescent tubes/ballasts, compact fluorescents, halogens, etc.

PAINTS, STAINS AND FINISHES

ELECTRONICS

- Anything with a cord or battery (including cellphones)
- Ink cartridges

BATTERIES

- All battery types must be kept separate and stored in their original packaging, or in a plastic container (not metal)
- It is recommended to add electrical tape to the terminals on the batteries to avoid hazards such as fires.

OIL PRODUCTS (no cooking oil)

- Lubricating oil, free of contaminants
- Oil filters and containers

GLYCOL AND ANTIFREEZE

STYROFOAM

- Only clean, white #6 Styrofoam, must be rigid
- No packing peanuts or food containers

MATTRESS RECYCLING NEW!

- Mattresses (including crib and futon) must be clean
- Box springs must be clean

COMPOST PAD

- Leaf and yard waste accepted
- No food waste accepted

WASTE

CURBSIDE PICK-UP, LANDFILLS & TRANSFER STATIONS

NON-RECYCLABLE PLASTIC

- Soiled plastic
- Chip bags and candy wrappers
- Coffee pods and K-cups
- Plastic plates and cutlery
- Plastic film packaging (such as toilet paper packaging or

NON-RECYCLABLE HOUSEHOLD METAL

- Aluminum foil
- Soiled household metal

NON-RECYCLABLE PAPER AND CARDBOARD

- Soiled paper or cardboard (take-out containers, etc.)
- Tissue, paper towels, laminated paper items
- Pet food bags, flour bags, etc.
- Paper cups (coffee, soda, etc.)

FOOD WASTE

- Table scraps, spoiled food, cooking oil/grease (cooled)
- Meat remains/bones/shells
- (wrapped in newspaper; no carcasses)

GLASS AND CERAMICS

- Plate glass, mirrors, broken glass (wrapped in paper), food iars

What about **STYROFOAM?**

Clean, white #6 Styrofoam, can be recycled at County landfills and transfer stations. It must be rigid and cannot be flexible. Packing peanuts and food containers are not accepted.

Currently, Styrofoam can't be recycled through the curbside pickup
