New doctors headed to Lac La Biche County

Our community is set to receive a much-needed injection of healthcare services.

Four new doctors are on their way and should start work within the next year and a half, pending approval by Alberta Health Services. AHS is also expecting new international nurses to join our local healthcare team this winter.

The doctor shortages we've been experiencing are troubling for everyone. The County has been working hard to help recruit and retain medical professionals, and we proudly support organizations like the Lac La Biche Regional Health Foundation and the Regional Attraction & Retention Society in their work. Healthcare is a cause that's near and dear to all community members' hearts, and we know access to reliable medical services plays an enormous role in our residents' quality of life.

FIRE SEASON HAS ARRIVED

Spring is just around the corner, and we're expecting a dry one.

Fire season runs until October 31. Permits are required for all burning except campfires. Fortunately, permits are free and easy to get.

For fire permits from the County:

- 1. Visit laclabichecounty.com.
- 2. Click on "Protective Services" in the menu under "Our Services."
- 3. Scroll to "Burn Permits and Fire Season" and click on the permit application link.
- 4. Complete the interactive form.
- 5. Need help? Call 780-623-6767.

Note: We can only issue fire permits for lands outside the Forest Protection Area. If you live in the FPA, you must get your permits from the Government of Alberta. Visit **alberta.ca**/ **get-a-fire-permit** or call 780-623-5388 for information. Burning without a valid permit is against the law and can be extremely dangerous. Getting a permit also tells us when and where to expect smoke, so firefighters don't waste precious time and resources responding to false alarms.

Your burn is your responsibility

In every fire season, we ask residents to burn responsibly by obeying the conditions listed on their permits and paying close attention to fire restrictions. This year, we can't emphasize this responsibility enough. All signs point to drought conditions this spring and summer, which could mean a *very* busy fire season, so we are urging residents not to take any chances.

If you lose control of a burn and the fire department has to put it out, you may be charged for the cost of the emergency response.

Take steps to protect yourself and your property:

- 1. All residents should have emergency plans and emergency kits.
- Residents should apply for free FireSmart property assessments. We can recommend ways to make your property safer, and we can even help with brush removal. Visit laclabichecounty.com/p/ protective-services or call 780-623-6774 for information or to apply.
- 3. Agricultural producers should have fire extinguishers with them when they're out working.
- 4. No matter what vehicle or equipment you're using, be aware of how it affects dry soil and vegetation. Make sure any "hot spots" are monitored and cleaned so they don't accidentally start fires.

Sign up for our Local Emergency Alerting System

With an unusually mild winter behind us, many residents are wondering about our emergency preparedness – and theirs – in the months ahead.

One easy thing that every resident can do is register for the County's Local Emergency Alerting System. Every second counts in a crisis; this system provides instant notifications about nearby emergencies.

Visit laclabichecounty.com and click on "Local Emergency Alerting System" to learn more and register. You can sign up for text messages, voice calls or emails (or all three) and you can also subscribe to optional non-emergency notifications.







WATERSHED WORKINGS: Plamondon Creek restoration

As part of our Lac La Biche Watershed Management Plan, we're looking at ways to restore shoreline habitat along Plamondon Creek, in partnership with local landowners. This creek flows into Plamondon Bay, affecting Lac La Biche Lake's overall water quality. Healthy shorelines are essential for clean water and strong ecosystems, as they can filter runoff, prevent erosion, and provide food and homes for birds, fish and other wildlife.

PROPERTY HISTORY

Your property tells a story. If you've ever wondered what happened in the chapters before you took possession, our Planning & Development team can bring you up to speed.

We can provide copies of permits and approvals that Lac La Biche County has issued for your property, so you can finally tell what the deal is with that old shed in the corner of the yard, or why the previous owners never built a deck in the ideal spot for one.

How do I ask for my property's records? If you are the property owner, or if you have authorized someone else by written consent, you can complete a routine disclosure request form (available on our website) and email it to planning.development@laclabichecounty.com. Keep in mind there will be a fee for the records search.

To find the form:

- 1. Visit laclabichecounty.com.
- 2. Click on "Access to Information" in the menu under "Our Services." Then click on "Routine Disclosure & Active Dissemination Procedure." The form is at the end of the procedure document.

Our team will search your land file(s) and provide available records.

Plan for Alexander Hamilton Park's future approved



Council has approved a management plan for Alexander Hamilton Park, to balance the park's many different uses and prepare for improvements.

Two new developments that are already planned include a stormwater pond and a mountain bike trail system. These and other future additions, like expanded walking trails and enhanced picnic spots, need to be compatible with the park's existing features, especially its status as an off-leash dog area.


