Fire season ends on Oct. 31

As temperatures drop, so does the fire hazard. Fire season is expected to end on Thursday, Oct. 31. After Halloween, fire permits will not be required for burning again until the <u>spring</u>.

Permits may not be necessary for now, but residents are still strongly encouraged to report any burning that takes place so our firefighters know where to expect smoke. This limits the number of false alarm calls that occur. Residents are responsible for their own burning at all times, and may be held liable if they lose control of their fires.

DOES YOUR SIGN NEED A PERMIT?

This is your sign... to learn about permitting requirements. After all, not all signs are created equal.

You may have heard that signs are regulated by Lac La Biche County's Land Use Bylaw, and while that's true, that doesn't mean every sign requires a development permit.

There's a wide variety of situations where permits for signs are <u>not</u> needed, including but not limited to the following:

- Signs displayed inside a building;
- Signs displayed in or on a working vehicle;
- Signs displayed on door plates, door boards or kick plates;
- Construction lot identification signs;
- Signs related to construction work (e.g. contractor signs) as long as they're on the same lot where construction is taking place;
- Development information signs (e.g. "Coming soon to this location...");
- Private sale signs like garage sale signs;

There are lots of other situations where signs don't need development permits. If you're looking to put up a sign or replace an existing one, the easiest way to find out what's required is to contact our Planning & Development team. Staff members can tell you exactly what's needed and help you through the permitting process.


